
• offer guided tours twice a day on those weeks. Our planned dates are 2nd to 15th May and 11th to 25th June.

RECOLLECTIONS OF KEVIN UMBACK

A few months before he died Kevin Umback wrote down his memories of the Old Bega Hospital.


My sister and I were admitted to the Bega Hospital for diarrhoea in the late 1920's but as soon as felt well enough we decided to discharge ourselves. We were caught going down the front steps near Matrons office which was just as well as it was quite a few miles out to our home at Pericoe sheep station, Peters Swamp.

The night nurse found her way around by way of a hurricane lamp.

Stan Maples was employed to milk the hospital cows. He acted also as wardsman and drove the Hospital Lizzie (a car) to convey the nurses to and from town or their homes, a distance of two miles. He was a character - he always wore his britches at half mast to avoid the long wet grass.

Early September each year was set aside as hospital day with donations of cakes, eggs and any foodstuffs but especially eggs when the chooks were beginning to lay after a winter lay off





Dr. John McKee was one of the early doctors to come to the Bega Hospital c1920 settling in at Bega Street and his surgery 'Dunvegan' where he remained the entirety of his professional career. In 1928 he was called to view the shotgun murder of Wolumla schoolteacher Mulholland on the front lawn of Nat Reid's house opposite the school.

Young John Murphy lost a thumb in the sausage machine in his fathers butchers shop. Undeterred Dr. Loftus took a bone from one of his toes and grafted it onto the stump of the thumb successfully repairing the thumb less the nail. John was able to hold a glass of beer and wiggle his new thumb much to the delight of his mates.


Joe Wheatley, an elderly friend of Dr Loftus had his leg packed in ice. Dr. Loftus operated and amputated the leg near the knee. Joe was able to hobble around for many years

IN OUR COLLECTION

Timber Jinker. Cat No Z6012

Found in the forest reserve near Bega by Duntroon cadets in the 1980's and donated originally to the National Museum of Australia (1986.37) the artifact was deaccessioned and accepted into the Bega Valley Historical Societies collection in 1997. A rare survivor of the local timber industry this vehicle is of high importance to the collection.

Known variously as logging wheels in North America and simply as a pair of wheels in England the term inker may have been applied only in Australia. Because of the hard work these vehicles were required to withstand and the harsh environments in which they were often left to deteriorate there are few examples preserved in collections. The massive scale of their construction is in itself significant as testimonial to the achievement of the coach building industry that built the wheels and bolsters and forged the heavy cranked axles. The use of the term bobtail means cut off or shortened or more likely in this case referring to its relatively small size. It should be noted that there is a potentially confusing use of the term bob in English horse drawn vehicle language to describe a two wheel jinker.



Caroline Burgess nee Moon.

Caroline was one of the first children born in the Bega area, arriving on the 12th October 1844 at the beach of Moon Bay near Tathra. Her parents, Frederick and Jane (Duff), had travelled down the coast by boat with a load of sheep. Various stories are told of why they landed at Moon Bay but Jane had gone into labour and Fred had to assist his wife with the delivery of a healthy daughter.

Fred then walked westward over the bushland range to the little settlement of Bega that he knew was over the mountain where his friend and fellow ex convict, Thomas Underhill, resided and worked for Dr. George Imlay at Tarraganda.

He eventually found Thomas at the black smiths where he worked and after hearing his story Mrs. Underhill (Jane Kirkland) found a baby's outfit which she sewed to the back of his jacket to keep it clean on his way back to his new family.

Caroline's baptismal record in July 1845 states that her father Frederick was a shepherd living at Numbugga. Caroline was the first of nine children born to Fred and Jane. Frederick , who was from London, died

at Numbugga in June 1870 aged 61. Jane, born in Scotland, survived another 35 years dying in Bega in 1905. Caroline's brother Robert is well known as the man who discovered the Buchan Caves in Victoria


where his family made a living from tourism to the caves area.

Her sister Catherine married a Bega blacksmith named Henry Brown who used to raucously celebrate the anniversary of the American War of Independence. Henry's real name was Henry Loeher whose parents had moved from Essen in Germany to America. Henry had fought in the Civil War and jumped ship at Twofold Bay, Eden, with a friend John Pruss ,the first of another pioneer family.

Another sister, Jane, married Charles Adam Weppler, another German. Their son Adam married his cousin Lydia Burgess. Jane was widowed in 1899 and she remarried in 1906 to John Hergenhan.

Caroline was married on the 9th of October 1863 to George Burgess. George was born in 1836 at Clavering, Essex and arrived on the Sultana in 1856.

They had twelve children while living at North Bega all of whom, except for the first and last, survived to adult hood. Sadly Caroline died three years after the birth of her youngest child. She only saw two of her daughters married and just missed seeing the birth of her first grandchild, Raymond Bofinger. She died on 2 February 1892 aged 47 and is buried beneath the Bega High School in the first official Bega cemetery.

John Coman - Pioneer

JOHN COMAN, of Wongaryka, is the third son of William Coman of Eurobodalla, and was born in Condon, Moruya, in 189. Educated in his native town, he afterwards entered the employ of his father, whom he assisted in the management and working of a farm. In 187 he selected a piece of land, on which he erected his present homestead, "Wongaruka". This estate comprises 8 acres. In 1873 Mr. Coman discovered the Bumbo Reef, which for two years, he worked with profit. He afterwards proceeded to Queensland, where, in conjunction with his brothers, he took over the Wyroo Station, of 500 square miles, on the lower Diamantina. This they stocked with 800 head of cattle. On disposing of the property to Walter Douglas, they organised an exploring party, and, proceeding westward, crossed the Herbert and Hamilton Rivers, penetrating as far as Lake Phillipi, which they discovered. Here they took up 2000 square miles of territory, which they sold to advantage to Messrs. Parker, Wolsley and Brown. Going further west, they took up 2500 square miles of country on then an unknown river, which they called Sylvester, and named the station Sandringham. The subject of this sketch here detached himself from the party to proceed to Blackall, the nearest Lands Office, a distance of 700 miles over then an almost unexplored tract, in order to make the necessary application for the above squatting area. After securing the country he retraced his steps as far as the confluence of the Barcoo and Thompson Rivers, where they form Coopers Creek. Here by arrangement the brothers were to meet, but through unavoidable causes the other members of the family were a month behind the appointment time. He was alone, and felt in sore troubles as to the safety of his brothers, as the natives were at that time waging war against the whites, and also the danger they ran of dying of thirst from the scarcity of water. The entire party started for their native district. Travelling up the Liatra Creek, then across the Bulloo, crossing it at Thergamunda, then on to the Wilson, Paroo, and Warregoo Rivers the latter they followed down to the Darling, then along the Darling to Louth, across the back blocks, through Cobar on to the Lachlan at Condobolin, over the Mana Mountain, on to Lake Corvel, then up the Bland to the Murrumbidgee Falls, on to Wagga Wagga, and finally arriving at their native district through Yass. Mr Coman has since resided on his property at Cobargo. In 1881 he married Elizabeth, fourth daughter of John Collins, of the "Oaks", Candelo.

Joseph Britten and James (Jim) Augustine Hanscombe had been friends since childhood and joined up at the same time to "fire a few pot shots at the Germans".

Jim was the eighth child of dairy farmer William Hanscombe and his wife Catherine, nee Carroll. There were fourteen children in the family.

Joe was from the neighbouring dairy farm. Son of Joseph and Emma Britten

The two friends often went into Bega on a Friday night for a drink with friends at the Family Hotel.

On October 6th, 1915 Jim Hanscombe, his brother Charles, and Joseph Britten enlisted.

They left Sydney on HMAT "Star of England" on March 8, 1916.

In 1917 they were deployed in the 5th Divisional Ammunition Corps, Australian Field Artillery as drivers.

On 6/7 October, 1917 they were delivering ammunition through Hells Fire Corner on the Menin Road when there column came under heavy shelling. For three hours they were unable to advance. Number 2 driver, and his assistant were killed and Joseph Britten seriously wounded. Jim Hanscombe ran across the open ground and carried Joe back to his truck. He delivered his ammunition and then took Joe to a field hospital where Joe died.

Jim Hanscomber received the Military Medal for Bravery In The Field. Ön the night of 6/7 October 1917, this driver was in a column on the Menin Road bringing up ammunition. The column was heavily shelled for about three hours, during which a shell killed another driver in his team, killed one male and wounded two others. While the third driver cleared the road, Driver Hanscombe cleared his wagon and unaided carried on and delivered his ammunition. Although considerably shocked himself, Hanscombe showed a fine example of bravery and devotion to duty deserving of recognition".

He returned to Australia and married Gladys Buckley, daughter of the Family Hotel proprietor, Con Buckley. He died on 21st September, 1967 as a result of being hit by a car in Carp Street, Bega.

Joseph Britten was buried in Birr Cross Roads Cemetery, Zillebeke, Belgium, grave number 113.
