

Digitisation of the Bega District News (BDN) - 1923 to 1954

The BDN newspaper project was commenced in early 2021 – sorting, doing an inventory and introducing a new filing system for the BDN's held at the Museum. A visit followed to the State Library of NSW to ensure that all copies of the BDN held at the Museum were on microfilm at the Library. They were.

The next thought was digitisation of the BDN's so why not start from 1923 when a newspaper merger by Walter A Smith created the Bega District News. Contact was made with Trove (National Library of Australia) to understand the digitisation process and, more importantly, the costs. With that understood, the State Library gave their authority to release the microfilm masters to Trove when funding became available. The challenge was now about funding.

Why digitise the newspapers you might ask? It is the future. Firstly, about preservation and then discoverability – searching or browsing in the comfort of your home - for researchers and users alike versus trawling old newspapers on microfilm or thumbing through hard copies that will deteriorate over time.

Newspapers are an invaluable source to the researcher and to the curious placing articles in their time and place – be it local, community and beyond - family, social and political history. So, it is with our great appreciation to the donor, we announce this wonderful gift to the people of the Valley and beyond, as we report to our membership that the BDN's 1923 – 1954 will be available for viewing on Trove progressively over the next 6 to 8 months. WOMEN OF BEGA. Mary Louisa Fensom nee YOUNG.

Mary was born in Gipps Street Bega in 1869. Her father William Young was a shoemaker from Perth in Scotland and her mother was Dorothea Elizabeth Sturah, known as Doris.

Mary married a London born baker James John Fensom on February 8th 1886 at the Bega Presbyterian Church - she was 16years old.

James and His brothers Thomas and William had worked in Bega from 1874 bought out an earlier baker, Suttle & Co of Carp Street, in1890. Mary worked from this bakery delivering bread around the town. Mary's grandmother, Anna Sturah, had started one of the first bakeries in Bega in her home in Gipps Street.

Mary and James had four children prior to them moving to Sydney. James died in March 1913 at Croydon, Sydney.

A woman resident of Bega celebrated her 100th at the weekend with 50 members of her family - including her two great grandchildren. Mrs. Mary Louisa Fensom nee Young was born in Bega on November 2, 1868. She was married at the age of 16 and had four children, all still living. They are Arthur William, Mrs. Florence Dent, Albert Edward, and Mrs. Elsie Greenacre, and there are 9 grandchildren, and her great grandchildren ar Peta Barnaby aged 3 and Paul Blankenstein aged one year eight months. Mrs. Fensom has been a widow for 50 years and has lived in Bega most of her life.

Mary died on 30th June 1970 aged 101. She was a resident of Bodington Red Cross Hospital.

Mr. C Anderson's son had an accident - fell from horse.

March

Mr. Thomas Whyman – a son.

A Falkner's house at Towamba was destroyed by fire.

Mr. Perry's farm at Back Creek is for sale.

Hugh Carragher opened the Plough Inn at Wolumla.

R E Tooth and Co. made a cash purchase of malting barley.

The Archbishop of Sydney visited Bega.

'The Osborne' barque from Cardiff called at Eden for provisions before sailing on to Hong Kong.

The Archbishop of Goulburn was booked to preach at Bega, Kameruka, Pambula and Eden at the beginning of

The partnership of Isabella Barclay and Joseph Teas of Eden was dissolved.

Wesleyan Church Tea Meeting was held to discuss the laying of the foundation stone.

The Government Surveyor General and the Commissioner for Main Roads deferred construction of a bridge over Bega River due to costs




